



## Pupil Premium 2014/2015

### Principles:

Since 2011, when pupil Premium was introduced, funding was given to each school. The amount received is calculated by the amount of children eligible for Free School Meals (FSM), Looked after children or Children whose parents serve in the armed forces. Schools also receive funding for children who are not currently receiving free school meals but who have been eligible for them at any point during the previous six years, this is known as the Ever 6.

Pupil premium funding is to help schools provide support in a variety of ways for vulnerable children.

Individual schools decide how to spend their allocation but there is a requirement to publish online how this is spent.

### Leadership and Management:

The headteacher oversees the Pupil Premium provision at Park Lane Primary School. The deputy headteacher, Inclusions manager and School business manager work together to ensure the tracking of pupil premium children is at its highest level, enable a high level of support to be given and to monitor the impact it is having. Each eligible pupil at Park Lane Primary School receives an allocation of money so that they can access trips, swimming lessons, music lessons and individual items as necessary like, homework packs, breakfast clubs, PE kits, bags and school uniform.

### Focus for 2014 / 2015

The focus for this academic year at Park Lane primary School will be on reading. There will be extra reading materials being provided for children of all ages. Homework is still an area of concern so as previously mentioned we will ensure that pupils have access to homework materials by providing

therefore access to exciting and unique trips and music lessons are vital. PE kits and uniform will continue to be a focus; ensuring children are properly dressed for all weathers and experiences. Support for families is to be increased through breakfast and after school clubs. Nurture provision is to be put in place to support the children and offer extra support where appropriate. A key area is the attainment of year 2 and year 3 children, ensuring that the gap is narrowing and progress increasing. A priority for this year is to improve behaviour, safety and attendance so ensuring that a high majority of children behave at all times and attends school regularly and on time. Governors will be informed of the schools impact and progress at the Governing Body meetings that take place every six and a half weeks.

There is a Governor working committee for Pupil Premium children who will help to monitor the provisions given and its impact.

Teacher Support – £3251.22

Teaching assistant support – £47587.04

Inclusions manager support – £18926.35

Total Pupil Premium allocation per eligible child, per academic year = £15900.00

Specialist Teacher Visits – 2 times 3 hourly visits for 39 weeks, per academic year = £15732.00

Educational Psychology Visits – 3 hourly visits for 39 weeks, per academic year = £3802.50

HLTA Intervention groups – 21 times 1 hourly session for 39 weeks, per academic year = £9529.37

Speech & Language support = £7000.00

GST 5% of Pupil Premium = £5300.40

HLTA cover for PPA (less costs of Intervention above) = £10587.92

Homework packs = £300.00

Uniform / PE kits = £400.00 per academic year
